DDE's Commitment to Transformative Work with Centro Hispano



Funded in part by the Division of Diversity and Engagement, Centro Hispano completed its third year of their project entitled Latinos Empowered to Advocate and Dream: Centro Hispano Youth L.E.A.D and Postsecondary Access Program. This program has served over 300 Latinx youth in 2022 through workshops designed to help with post-secondary access, cultural identity, and career and leadership development. Students received support in various ways including one-on-one coaching.

2022 Impact Highlights:

- 51 youth and young adults received individual college & career counseling for a total of 72.75 hours
- 25 youth have participated in the L.E.A.D. program throughout 2022
- 11 workshops, 313 total attendees (Students, Parents, and Community)
- 75 students and family members attended the Latino College and Resource Fair. The far raised **\$3,000** for Golden Eagle Scholarship which was awarded to **3** seniors
- **5** Latinx youth in high school or college completed paid internships during the summer camp, 11 Latinx college students received stipends to be mentors paired with rising seniors to help with the college application process
- 6 college tours 4 career panels/workshops
- 4 college fairs
- **4** FAFSA/Financial Aid workshops
- 6 cultural/community building events

Associate Vice Chancellor Dr. Lamar Bryant and Executive Director Dr. Janelle Coleman represented the Division of Diversity and Engagement at the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools <u>Commission on Colleges</u> by leading an interactive presentation as they shared their approach to engaging with stakeholders in the diversity strategic planning process while sharing ownership of the work throughout an organization.

During the presentation, they addressed considerations for administrators tasked with the planning process, and entrusting representatives across academic departments with carrying out the strategy, adjusting when the need arises, and creating a rubric from constructive criticism. Participants left the session with the tools needed to prepare for their own strategic planning efforts.
